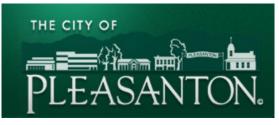

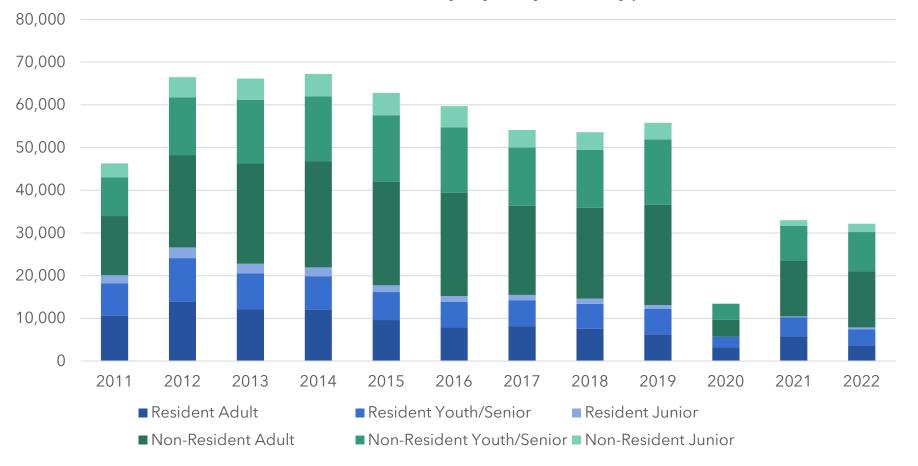

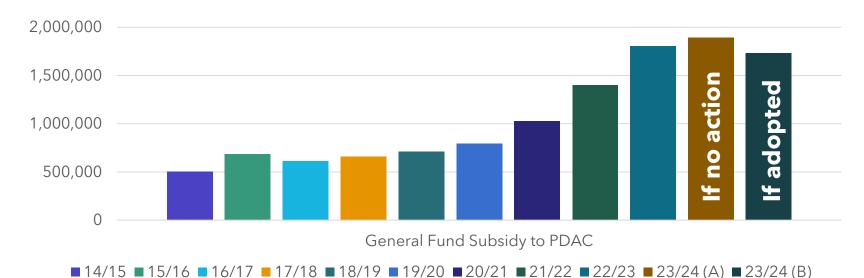

- Management fees

# **Options Discussed at Study Session**

#### **Fees remain the same**

- Minimal impact to patron cost
- Continued increase in General Fund subsidy
- Approx. 35% cost recovery continues to decline with rising operational costs

Immediate increase to 60% cost recovery

- Dramatic immediate impact on patron cost
- Cost recovery will likely decline below 60% quickly unless an inflator is built in
- Potential for incomequalified discounts

**Gradual increase** with evaluation

- Smaller increases each year toward 60% recovery rate
- 5-year plan levels out to approx. 40% cost recovery
- Potential for incomequalified discounts
- Annual impact evaluation

# **Additional Considerations**

# Reassessment of fee impact after Year 1

- Present update to Council at the end of the 2024 recreational swim
- Consider moving forward to Year 2
- Consider update to 60% recovery rate

### **Financial Aid**

- Piggyback on existing income-based programs
  - Various utilities
  - Nine desert cities
  - Qualify for 2011-2023 rate schedule

### New Management Contract

- Currently undergoing RFP process for new management contract (YMCA extended to 12/31/2023)
- Increase programming and reporting
- Evaluate potential for City management

# **Financial Aid**

The financial aid program would roll out with the fee increase January 1, 2024

Residents of the nine cities of the Coachella Valley are eligible

Visitors would show one of the qualifying utility bills
